


Program Overview

Who is Adelaide Hunter Hoodless?

Adelaide Hunter Hoodless began her public life after the death of her fourth child, John Harold, due to 'stomach complaint'. Seemingly blaming herself for this tragedy, Adelaide's campaign sought to raise the level of education for girls and to put support in place for women so that they might safeguard their families. She was the inspiration and co-founder of the first women's Institute along with Erland and Janet Lee.

They co-founded the first Women's Institute with Adelaide Hunter Hoodless at their home in February 1897. Together they decided that an organization similar to the Farmers Institute would be beneficial to rural women.



ADELAIDE HUNTER HOODLESS HOMESTEAD

Growing Up At The Willows: An Early Settler Life, Grade 3



Grade 3 Program

Students will explore the life of the Hunter family in the 1850s with a focus on the roles of each member of the family to run the household. Students will explore the historic house, grounds and birthplace of the Co-founder of Women's Institute through creative hands-on activities and learn about the Women's Institute and its legacy today.

Duration: 120 Minutes

Curriculum Connections:

The students will develop skills to describe the similarities and differences in various aspects of everyday life, compare the roles and challenges facing people in Canada in the 19th century as well as evaluate evidence and draw conclusions about some of the major challenges facing different groups and communities in Canada.



Program Outline

Station 1: Pantry

Students will learn about cooking practices of the Early Settlers, and participate in a cooking activity which they will taste at the end of the program.

Station 2: Parlour

Students will learn about the Hunter family & what they did in their free time.

Station 3: Addie's Room

Students will learn about the first W.I..

Station 4: Jane's Room

Students will learn about the Hunter kids & their roles in the household.

Station 5: Reception Room

Students will explore our exhibit & Homestead

Station 6: Learning Centre

Students will learn about Tweedsmuir History Books. Students will each make a page for their class' own Tweedsmuir History Book
