Who is Adelaide Hunter Hoodless?

Adelaide Hunter Hoodless began her public life after the death of her fourth child, John Harold, due to 'stomach complaint'. Seemingly blaming herself for this tragedy, Adelaide's campaign sought to raise the level of education for girls and to put support in place for women so that they might safeguard their families. She was the inspiration and co-founder of the first women's Institute along with Erland and Janet Lee.

They co-founded the first Women's Institute with Adelaide Hunter Hoodless at their home in February 1897. Together they decided that an organization similar to the Farmers Institute would be beneficial to rural women.

Adelaide's Dream - It Takes A Village: Senior Program



Senior Program

Participants will explore the birthplace of the co-founder of the Women's Institute, engage in discussions on women's history, the roles of the Lee Family, Adelaide, and the local community played in the creation and development of the W.I. Participants will explore the historic house and grounds through creative hands-on activities and artifact handling!

Duration: 200 Minutes; 3.3 Hours

Station 1: Pantry

Participants will learn about the Hunter Family's humble beginnings and the lives of the Hunter Children would lead.

Station 2: Parlour

Participants will learn about the leisure life of the Hunter family.

Station 3: Upstairs

Participants will learn about the first Women's Institute, and the roles the Lee family and Adelaide played in its creation.

Participants will get to independently explore the temporary exhibit

Station 5: Learning Centre

Participants will learn about Tweedsmuir History Books and will make their own!
